Parowan Animal Assistance League (PAAL)

The Parowan Animal Shelter is a NO KILL facility which temporarily houses and cares for abandoned or lost dogs. Currently space is limited.

PAAL is a non-profit organization staffed entirely by volunteers who are dedicated to the care of the dogs we take in.

Duties of our PAAL members include feeding and providing fresh water daily, cleaning the runs and kennels, and probably one of the most important things is to provide comfort and attention for the frightened and confused animals.

One of our volunteers reads to the dogs and they respond very positively to the attention. The dogs are brushed, played with, given treats, and generally worked with. We have had great success with several in our care due to the efforts of all of our volunteers.

Since the shelter is meant to be temporary housing, PAAL works to adopt out or transfer the dogs to rescue organizations if an owner fails to claim them. If you love animals and can donate some of your time to volunteer, please contact Mary Hanley at 435-704-4112.

From the Parowan Solid Waste Truck Drivers

In order for the Parowan Solid Waste Truck Drivers to ensure prompt and efficient disposal, please:

 Have your garbage can(s) out by 7:00 am on your scheduled pickup day.

Tuesday—West Side Wednesday—East Side

- Place lid opening of can towards street.
- Place cans 5 feet apart if you have multiple cans.
- Place can on city streets. Cans cannot be picked up on private driveways.
- Branches, shrubs, etc. need to be cut to 2 foot lengths.
 Longer lengths may get hung up on the truck pre-

venting the rest of the garbage from falling into the truck.

- Lid has to close; this keeps trash from being spilled into the roadway.
- No trash outside the container can be picked up.
- Only "Parowan City" cans will be emptied.
- No metal or construction material.

Amos Chester Hatch: Parowan's 20th Century Potter

One of my most enjoyable journeys of late was reading the extensive family history of Amos Chester Hatch. It's compiled by a son, Oleen N. Hatch. Mike Robinson, A.C.'s grandson, shared it with me. It is a treasure. Therein is found not only family histories but pieces of Parowan's history. It reflects diligence, sacrifice, courage, devotion to family, church, and country. It's truly an American story.

In 1927, Mr. Hatch came to Parowan as a young family man to teach school, coach, and be the high school principal. He and his wife, Sarah Edna, were born in Davis and Box Elder counties respectively. Their arrival was expected to be temporary. Yet, here they remained. How privileged Parowan has been to have had them so deeply planted in our community circle.

Mr. Hatch was a family man. Their family eventually consisted of nine children. He was a welleducated individual who taught the Social Sciences, coached, and was the PHS principal. He tried his hand at farming, became a decorated soldier in both WWI and WWII having remained in the army reserves between the wars. He became an officer and a gentleman, completing his "tours of duty" as a Colonel. A good number of accolades were bestowed on him and his eventful life gives us a hint as to why he remains so prominent in local history. He was always a contributor, sometimes in large and other times in small ways. For example, in 1933 he was known as the "Parowan Pit Barbecuing Specialist." Asked where he learned the skill, he said he may have read the of public relations and pupil indirections somewhere and tried it

out. Family history indicates that reading and studying it out in his mind was his routine.

The years after WWII brought major changes in A.C. Hatch's life. Once again, he was reinstalled as the Parowan High principal. He worked hard upgrading the school after the erosion of programs because of the war. Athletic fields were improved, curriculum was solidified, and he got interested and became involved in ceramics at the school. Herein are quotes from a paper A.C. wrote to the local school board about school and community collaboration: "A Parowan discovered excellent bodies of clay. They formed and fired utensils from this material out of pure necessity... Pottery making became a lost art here for more than fifty years. Now the beds are relocated and again put to use. We feel at Parowan High School that our gift of nature might well be used as material for I handle nothing but slip creative art. We tested the clay body and had the University of Utah School of Mines give us an analysis. The result of this investigation encouraged us to attempt the fabrication of certain types of pottery...The popularity of this project is due to a number of psychological and pedagogical appeals inherent in pottery making. . . The pottery project spills over into the physics and chemistry departments. Testing materials there gives measurements purpose and interest to experiment. The mechanic arts department has been indispensable in designing and building and mixing machinery and potters' wheels. There has been no expense to the school board except the purchase of a small electric kiln, the cost of firing the kiln, and some glazing materials. This project is justified as a part of the school curriculum on the grounds

terest. It is a medium of artistic

and handicraft expression. It gives purpose and interest to several departments."

When Mr. Hatch retired in 1958, his ceramics interest had become his driving force. In a 1969 Deseret News article entitled, "From Military to Mud-From Pupils to Pottery" it was reported that Mr. Hatch delivered his ceramic works of art far and wide in the Utah areas, particularly where shops near the Utah Parks were located. At the Big Rock Candy Mountain resort the owner wrote a postcard indicating he needed more with the message: "Can use ½ gross small pitchers hundred years ago the pioneers of and couple dozen medium - soon as you can send."

> Mr. Hatch said of his labors, "I wanted to keep busy." He strained the clay, mixing it with water in a discarded electric washing machine, and poured the liquid mud called "slip" into molds. He lamented, "I don't have time for my potter's wheel so work." After carefully firing the pots at precisely 1839 degrees for 3 hours in an electric kiln which he constructed, he dipped his artistic beauties in a glazing liquid and baked them for an additional 5 hours.

Some called him "Famous Amos." Often, his work was featured in news/business articles. In 1975 he was spotlighted on KSL television. He never tired of his projects and he received countless recognitions for his beautiful, useful work. He gave his pots as wedding and birthday gifts, and to neighbors and friends. And while Amos Chester Hatch is gone, his legacy lives

So, just a thought: The clay is still in the east hills near Parowan and one might wish that another Parowan Potter would emerge. What an entrepreneurial adventure that would be! And after all, it's been at rest for these past 50 years, again.
