Telephone Communication: We have made it easy for you to reach out to us via telephone. All members of the City Council and our Office Administrative staff are readily available to address your concerns and answer your questions through a phone call or message system through our office requesting a call back.

Office Hours: To accommodate your busy schedules, we maintain regular office hours with an "open door" policy. From Monday to Thursday, our doors are open from 9:00 am to 4:30 pm, and on Fridays from 9:00 am to 12:00 pm.

Social Media: Parowan City is present on social media platforms such as Facebook. By following our official page, Parowan Utah, along with the Parowan Library and other relevant accounts, you can receive updates and engage with us in a more interactive manner.

Newspaper Articles: We are fortunate to have the dedicated efforts of local Iron County Today reporter, Jennelle Zajac. She has been instrumental in bringing our community news to a wider audience through frequent and timely newspaper articles distributed through the mail for free on a weekly basis.

<u>Emergency Communications</u>: In critical situations, we use the Everbridge system to communicate important information and updates. If you opt in, you will receive phone, email or text notifications for emergency alerts and other critical messages.

<u>Posted Bulletins</u>: For notices and events, we ensure that information is posted at the post office, library, and City Office. These bulletin boards are reliable sources for updates and announcements.

If you ever find yourself in need of information, whether it's general or specific, we encourage you to utilize these communication paths. Should you have trouble finding what you're looking for, please don't hesitate to reach out to any City Council member or administrative staff. We are here to answer your questions, share information, and provide guidance on where to find the resources you need.

If you have any additional ideas to further improve communication between Parowan City and the community, or if you have specific action items in mind, please let us know. 
It is very nice to see people walking their dogs and we would like to remind you that there is a leash law. Dogs must be on a leash. If your

Minnie's Mansion: A Place Worth Remembering By Sandra Benson



It was summer, 1921 and Minnie's Mansion, built by Charles Adams and managed by his daughter, Miriam (Minnie) Adams Burton, was opening for business. This new enterprising adventure was located on the meadow far to the south of Brian Head Peak and a short distance inside today's north entry to Cedar Breaks National Monument. It stood on the east side of the road, southeast of the North Overlook.

This new establishment offered an eating place, a center for socializing, dancing, and relaxing. Word of it being finished enough for business spread throughout the valley and very quickly it became a favorite establishment for locals. There were sightseers and campers who came to check it out but they were not alone. In the early 20th century, whole families spent the summer in and around 1933, the the area, still known as "Little Ireland." Herds of animals were grazing, cheese making was a summer industry, and loads of lumber were harvested and hauled down Parowan's Main Canyon. Minnie's Mansion of fered something new for those who were on the mountain

through the duration of summer.

The building was large though roughly built (the pictures somewhat resemble Parowan's Rambouillet Barn). It contained the first kitchen/ restaurant, located in the area. Oldtimes said, "The food was excellent when prepared by Hattie Heap" but not so much when Minnie cooked. It seems that Minnie was more frugal with her ingredients and would do things like add cereal to bread mix to make it go farther (a Veda Adams memory). It was also the first commercial lodging in the area with four guest rooms upstairs and an open balcony overlooking the beautiful dance hall floor below. There were also two guest cabins outside, north of the main building.

What Minnie may have lacked in cooking took nothing away from her being a fine hostess. She ran a tidy establishment. She expected proper decorum in her place! Hats came off when you entered her building, and if your shoes were muddy, they too were left at the door.

Sadly, Minnie's Mansion was rather short lived as a business. Unable to turn a profit during the short summer season, the business closed. Today, even traces of what once was has disappeared. When Cedar Breaks National Monument was estab-

lished in Parks Service cornered the market on travel accommodations and meals in the mountains.

However, lest we forget, some years ago Minnie Adams Burton's family collaborated with the U.S. Parks Service and Department of the Interior to record by-gone years when summer activities on the Mountain centered around Minnie's Mansion. At that time, there was a monument erected (since removed) and on the Plaque it said:

"Listen! Can You Hear the Echoes"

"Imagine standing here on a Sat~ urday night in the early 1920s. You might have heard music, laughter, people dancing and folks talking about their day's work out on the mountain plat~ eau. The music and voices would have come from a nearby inn known locally as Minnie's Mansion, built by Charles Adams and his daughter Minnie in 1921. In those days, it was common for the ranchers and their families to establish camps here on the mountain when they moved their dairy cows and sheep to the high plateaus for summer grazing."

"Thank you," David Burton, for sharing the history of your grandmother, Mrs. Miriam "Minnie" Adams Burton. The next edition will have some more on life in the Mountains. The stories are too many to share in one writing.
