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#### DECLARATION OF CANDIDACY PERIOD FOR THE 2023 MUNICIPAL GENERAL ELECTION

In accordance with UCA 10-3-301, **NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN** that the following positions are to be voted upon in the Parowan City 2023 Municipal Election on November 7, 2023:

# THREE (3) AT-LARGE CITY COUNCIL POSITIONS

4~year term each

The constitutional and statutory qualification requirements for municipal office are:

- 1. The person is a registered voter in the municipality.
- 2. The person will be at least 18 years old at the time of the next election.
- 3. The person is a legal resident of the municiapality for 12 consecutive months immediately preceding the date of the election.
- 4. The person has not been convicted of a felony.

Candidate filing period **begins June 1, 2023 and ends June 7, 2023**, excluding Saturday and Sunday (UCA 20A-9-203). Declaration of Candidacy must be filed *in person* at City Hall with the Parowan City Recorder, located at 35 E. 100 N., Parowan, between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m.

## A Community Providing and Surviving

In the Parowan valley, throughout the last half of the 19th and well into the 20th centuries, it is safe to say a majority of male residents had a freighting story.

In the Luella Dalton book starting on page 421 Mrs. Dalton begins with, "Freighting, freighting, freighting was ever the lifeline of this little community. As soon as the virgin soil and resources were tapped, grain, flour, vegetables, butter and cheese, lumber and shingles began to flow like milk and honey. In the early settlement, there was very little need for cash at home as there was a system of exchange using whatever you had in surplus together with what everyone raised, providing most local needs. Wants were few beyond what was produced, and the little colony was practically selfsufficient."

This being said, by the 1860's, settlers wanted a bit more than that which could be produced here. Thus, there was a good deal of freighting back and forth from our territory eastward to the Missouri River. These freight/supply companies would leave Utah in April or early May and usually returned in December, hopefully before Christmas. The most commonly mentioned stop-off along the way was Ft. Kearney, Nebraska. For about 20 years, until it was closed in 1871, this military post and surrounding community was said to have about 2,000 immigrants and 10,000 oxen pass through during the month of May.

James J. Adams tells of his experience going on this trek with his father in the Robert Heybourne Co. neurial spirit went along with in 1864. He was a 16-year-old boy. From his age perspective he said, "This was a wonderful trip." He drove four yoke of oxen; his

leaders were two white steers, Bonnie and Bounce. They followed the old pioneer trail through Utah, went over the North Pass and across Sweetwater. He got his first buckskin pants and said, "Every time it rained, they'd stretch and stretch out longer." He'd have to roll them up but they lasted the whole trip (one set of clothes). He recalled that all they had to eat was baking powder bread and fried bacon although on one occasion he and his father traded for some molasses and grapes. "We poured the molasses over the grapes to help keep them and they surely tasted good. Then we bought fifty cents worth of eggs at a farm and got so many our water bucket wouldn't hold them. These surely helped out our bread and bacon diet."

Their return trip brought a supply of stoves to the territory, and a threshing machine purchased by Charles Y. Webb. James and his father made the trip once again in 1868.

By the 1880's, there was a large demand for goods and services beyond our settlement boundaries. If a local family needed a little cash, there was something here to haul to those who were in need outside our community. The mines in Pioche and De La Mar, Nevada, and Silver Reef, Utah paid well for supplies. Local freighters made deliveries to these booming mining areas and there was an instant economic gain in Parowan and surrounding communities. In the Dalton book, we learn that some of our locals set up stores in the mining towns with their hired team~ sters delivering on a regular schedule.

Thus, in Parowan, an entrepreheavily loaded wagons containing whatever the miners in Silver Reef or out in Nevada sought. Wherever their destination, our pioneers

off-loaded their goods and returned home with where-with-all and a plan for personal improvements at home.

In telling this history of freighting, it needs to be said that the men engaged were physically challenged and often broken down in their bodies early in life. Lifting huge barrels of supplies into great freighting wagons required strength and endurance. My grandfather was said to be one of the most powerful freighters. Dad, when describing his father, Mahonri Moriancumer Decker, said, "He had legs like tree trunks that were terribly bowed in his old age, huge, gnarled hands, powerful arms, and terrible arthritis with debilitating back and leg pain in his later years."

In an attempt to preserve the memory of this freighting era, there is an original freighter's hitching ring embedded in the cement in front of the Old Merc. There is a plaque above it. It's worth checking out. It's the last one remaining on our main street although there used to be several. Unfortunately, they became useless toe-stubbers. Suffice it to say, these freighters worked throughout their lives to provide tools and goods that would advance pioneer communities' search for a better life.

- The Parowan Airport project is on the horizon. This renovation will bring runway improvements along with additional hangers and more needed infrastructure at and around the Parowan Airport. These improvements will enhance the Industrial zoned area for Parowan and will be key for the future of economic development for our community.
- The UDOT Parowan Bridge project is scheduled. Plans are moving forward to relocate the bridge on Main/Hwy 91 to 100 West. These plans have been in the works for several years as our old bridge does not meet current flood clearance allowance or load requirements. This year is the scheduled year to finish up engineering and scheduling the start of construction will follow.
- Parowan's Historic Old Rock Church repairs and renovation evaluation. Architectural plans are being drafted and prioritized to begin a plan for preservation and protection of our historic gem. Old Rock Church Days (June 16th & 17th) fundraising dates are set and planning is in action to raise the needed money. There are many ways you can help! (See Page 3)
- Plans for new pickleball courts. We are in the process of designing, engineering and discussing Parowan Pickleball courts and the project will soon go out for bid. These courts will be paid for by a grant awarded to Parowan from the TRCC or "Restaurant Tax" from Iron County Tourism, but may require additional community donations to complete the project, depending on the number of courts our City Council and community decide is feasible to build. Stay posted for details on this new recreational facility.
- The Parowan Pool project is still hanging in the balance as we await the results of the feasibility

- study that will help determine direction for a new or renovated facility. If you have an opinion or viewpoint you'd like to share, your City Council members, Mayor and City Manager would appreciate hearing from you. Email addresses for each are found at parowan.org under "Your Government/Mayor & Council".
- A Parowan Active Transportation Plan is underway with Chris Wiltsie of Bike Utah leading the way toward a more walkable and bikeable community. Monthly meetings throughout the year will invite community involvement in this important plan. Watch for upcoming dates on the parowan.org website.

Additionally, we have had some changes and new members to our Parowan City advisory committees. We express gratitude to those who have served on these committees in the past and those willing to serve currently. We offer a tremendous debt of gratitude to Don Horton who has served for decades but recently has retired from the Airport Board and Water Board. Don has been such an asset through his involvement and we are so thankful to him for his service in our community.
