Candidate filing period begins June 1, 2021 and ends June 7, 2021, excluding Saturday and Sunday (UCA 20A-9 -203). Declaration of Candidacy must be filed in person at the Parowan City Recorder's Office located at 35 East 100 North, Parowan, between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m.

A person filing a Declaration of Candidacy for Municipal Office shall be a registered voter and shall have resided within the Parowan City limits for the

12 consecutive months immediately before the date of the election.

PLEASE BE CONSERVATIVE as this is a low water year.

Watering times

12:01 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. to 12:00 a.m. on scheduled days.

Plant lawn at your own risk.

For purposes of monitoring violations, do not use your culinary water from 10:00 a.m.to 6:00 p.m.

This schedule is subject to change, depending on availability of water.

STRICT ENFORCEMENT WILL BE IN PLACE

Parowan City will be issuing water violations for watering on wrong days and times.

We've Got What We've Got So.....?

The sun is baking our ground, the moisture comes in drips and dribbles, snowpack is extremely light, and it is time to plant and water the thirsty ground. Are we worried? Of course! But be not discouraged. Our history in this Great Basin tells us we will survive!

On July 23rd, 1847, one day before we claimed settlement of the land passed over by all other pioneers, a contingent of Mormon pioneers entered the valley of the Great Salt Lake, damned up City Creek and flooded the hardpacked ground of the desert. The intent was to soften the earth enough to be able to plant a few precious seeds late in the season so the settlers would survive a harsh winter.

Why on earth did these Mormon pioneers stay here? We know their history of being driven from pillar to post. But we also might recall their history of tenacity. These were a people who believed their Prophet, Brigham Young, was guided by the Lord. They truly believed their responsibility was not to advise the Lord (well, not too much) but, rather, to soldier on saying, "We've got what we've got, so what are we going to do with it?" And their answer: "Go to work."

Amazing! But the first Anglo-Saxons in the world to pioneer the art of irrigation were the Mormons. Since then, they have received widespread recognition for their success in cultivating the dry lands of the Great Basin and beyond. Today, scholars write, "The modern principles of irrigation can be traced to the lessons learned in the settling of the Great Basin in 1847 by the Mormon Pioneers."

Yes! Wherever you found a settlement within the Great Basin,

you found industry and selfpreservation, all linked to water. In the Luella Dalton book we learn that the lifeline of water came down our own "City Creek" and the first fields in our valley were directly north and west, leading to the Little Salt Lake. Then, about 1870, some outsider moved in and tried to claim the out-oftown water as waste water (apparently above the field crops). Obviously, such diversion of the precious flow could not be tolerated. But the farmers realized their scarce water was being wasted in it's journey to cultivated ground so Parowan's first Artesian well was they moved their cultivation closer to town. In the move next to town, all the farmers were cut down in their acreage but each landowner was allowed a garden southeast of the fields. Apparently, the intent was to produce food for the set~ tlers, then for the stock. And there was a constant vigil to keep ditches cleaned to increase the stream. . . waste not, want not! And, in pioneer settlements, progressive adjustments have always been sought.

There is an account in the Dalton book of a man, Lawyer John Brown, who came to Parowan in the 1850's from England. Upon his the mild winters have meant few arrival he began talking about underground water. He was sure there were "vast sources of underground water" that could be tapped. Many scoffed! But others pondered as they pictured the sage just Sandra opining.

brush lands converted into verdant farms and fields. The idea grew and William Holyoak said he'd pay for the cost of drilling if someone wanted to

try it. A few went to work. John and William Bentley built a derrick 80 feet high with three decks. Two months of drilling went by. The hole was 285 feet and dry. Mr. Holyoak grew tired of paying for nothing and they quit, lifted the drill rod and put their tools away. Then Alex Matheson said, "Listen!" There was a gurgle of water far down in the pipe, then it became a bubbling stream of water over the top. It is said, "They watched far into the night, almost worshipping. This was the realization of all their hopes." And born.

This tale makes me want to sing! And there are other water stories for next time.

NOTE: Going back to "We've got what we've got so what are we going to do with it?" I'd like to suggest what has been said to me about our present drought and that is maybe the Brian Head Fire was a blessing... well kinda. We lost MILLIONS of forest trees but the forest will come back (although never quite the same). However, those lost trees are not sucking up water we so desperately need today in our valley. And flash floods where little vegetation is left to hold them back. Maybe we have had prayers answered, or if that offends, maybe we're mighty lucky. Just saying
