• We have current Master Plan updates in process for Master Transportation, Master Active Transportation, Master Drainage and Master Water & Sewer Plans. We look forward to completion of those plans to guide us.

• We will continue to have an Iron County School Board member representing Parowan in the coming years & we have a new building with a Cafeteria and multipurpose gymnasium for our High School planned for construction to begin in spring of 2024.

• Improvements have been made on widening and armoring our flood channel and work will continue into the fall for additional stabilization.

Proposition 5: Parowan City RAP Tax

Parowan City Council voted unanimously to pose a ballot question to the citizens of the community this November 2023 General Election on whether the citizens want to implement a 0.1% (one-tenth of 1%) sales and use tax on qualifying purchases in the City that would generate revenue specifically allocated for recreation, arts, and parks programs and facilities in the City.

The yes or no question on the ballot will read: SHALL PAROWAN CITY, UTAH, BE AUTHORIZED TO IMPOSE A 0.1% SALES AND USE TAX TO HELP FUND RECREATIONAL AMENITIES, PARK FACILI-TIES, AND CULTURAL ARTS PROGRAMS AND FA-CILITIES IN PAROWAN?

An eligible voter may prepare a written argument for or against this ballot proposition by filing a request with the Parowan City Recorder, 35 E. 100 N., Parowan, UT before 5:00 p.m. no later than September 18, 2023. A voter information pamphlet will be mailed out to all residents, and a public hearing to receive comment will be held on the proposed RAP Tax.

Parowan Main Canyon climbs to over 10,000 feet in elevation. It has always been a beckoning place for hometown folks. When summers come, it is especially so.

In the first quarter of the 20th century, travelers who took to the mountains were on a rough, steep road. It was used to carry logging equipment up and lumber down, livestock up in early summer, and down again before the first snows came.

As indicated in last edition's account, livestock men and their families often made the mountain their summer home. By all accounts, most delighted in "roughing it" but many were also thrilled when Minnie's Mansion was established in 1921. That establishment offered a day off. a cooked meal the inhabitants of the mountain didn't need to cook, weekend dances, and many enjoyed a refreshing "cup a jo" or a glass of lemonade. It was a social get-a-way.

In the Parowan Times dated July 18, 1923, a 24th of July celebration was announced with the following details:

"Again Parowan will celebrate Pioneer Day, July 24th, at Cedar Breaks. The committee in charge is working diligently for a repeat of the big time enjoyed there a year ago, and there is every indication that it will succeed."

The Days Events:

- Flag raising at Brian Head Point
- Programs: a Toast to the Utah Pioneers,
- A good many Musical Numbers, Readings, Dancing
- Games, Rodeo, Horse Racing, and Fireworks

Then, in an apparent effort to get everyone up the mountain safely, the article said, *"Traffic Regulations: To avoid danger and long delays on the road please observe the following traffic rules:*

- All wagons reach the Breaks by Monday night (the 24th was on Tuesday that year).
- Cars may go Monday but cannot return until 2 p.m.
- No wagons are to be on the roads Tuesday.
- Cars need to leave camp Wednesday (the 25th) no later than 8:30 a.m.
- Because of the limited number of available automobiles, the committee strongly recommends that those who can, should take teams and wagons and as many of their neighbors with them as possible.

getting to the Breaks and those who have room for passengers will please register before Friday at the Parowan Auto Co. so the committee will know what arrangements to make."

Trekking up to Brian Head Peak and around the Mammoth in the summer months found many from Parowan camping near "Little Ireland." Folks were generally found in sheep wagons or tents with a few families building log cabins on personal property. For many families during the first half of the 20th century, this was their nearest thing to a vacation. Undoubtedly, in 1921, and for about a decade thereafter. Minnie's Mansion added to the attractions. However, with the mansion's closure and Cedar Breaks National Monument opening, the fireworks down in the Breaks, no matter how spectacular they might have been, were soon to be over. But memories told and retold still leave us charmed and more than a bit nostalgic. Small, close knit communities where the people come together in work, play and camaraderie still have a great deal of value.
