Top priority is a new approach to growth that we as a City Council and Administrative staff are calling "Rural Done Right." The goal is to shape Parowan's future with slow, managed growth that is pro-family, pro-business and pro-heritage and protects our precious resources and rural character.

We will be adjusting our municipal code in the coming months to reflect this direction for Parowan to grow smart, stay rural and keep Parowan a beautiful, peaceful community that is a wonderful place to be. Whether raising a family, settling into retirement or enjoying an unmatched lifestyle surrounded by all-season outdoor recreation, you will feel blessed to call Parowan home.

Heading into spring, several key projects are underway:

-The design phase is nearly complete for the historic Old Hwy 91 Bridge, with construction set for late fall. Our Water Recharge Project designed to replenish our Parowan Valley Aquifer is also set to begin construction in the fall of 2025 or early spring of 2026. Most of the funding for these two projects is coming from partnerships with other stakeholders and also from county, state and

-New to Parowan Rec this year will be Lazer Tag for the youth. This will take place in the fairgrounds building with two games per week. Season will run for four weeks.

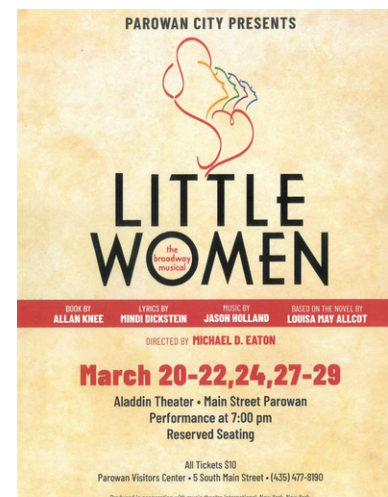
There will be barricades and unlimited amounts of fun! Registration is currently open. You can register at Parowan.org.

Why the Beehive is Utah's Iconic Symbol

In the 1980's, after a busload of PHS kids competed in the State History Fair and earned superior ratings in every category, the state coordinators sent PHS a book entitled "The Grand Beehive" and commended our school's youth and achievements. I glanced through the book and set it aside. However, in the past couple of years, the state has chosen a second state flag, with the Beehive on center stage. And I rediscovered the long forgotten book. I'd like to share a few points therein. Much of this information is quoted from "The Grand Beehive."

"The people of Utah have inherited and preserved a remarkable and largely unexamined treasury of folklore and art. An attractive aspect of this inheritance is the unusual way in which one particular traditional motif, the beehive, appears repeatedly. The recurring emblem and its use is both striking and pervasive. More importantly, the beehive motif carries with it a wealth of meaning and information about a people's culture (Utahns) and our psychological connections with the distant past."

The research then delves into the ancient world, explaining how the beehive was widely revered. It marches through the Middle Ages as the beehive symbol was embraced by many peoples, and especially the peoples of the United Kingdom. It cites the Masonic use of the symbol. Herein, it should be noted that a good many Utah pioneers were Masons. The final historic connection states, "Almost every western culture has looked on the hive as a model of the perfect social system."

And there you have it! A perfect social system was what the early pioneers sought!

The book states, "Though we don't know exactly where or when the beehive took hold of the Mormon imagination, we can speculate that its importance grew soon after Brigham Young succeeded Joseph Smith and led the Church into the West. As pioneers attempted to reorganize the hostile land according to an ideal inherited from the lush gardens of northern Europe, the beehive took on inspiring meaning. The hive as an agrarian model was crucial in the quest to reap the fruits of the earth and to make the desert 'blossom as the rose.' It is tempting to imagine that,

given all the emphasis on the traditional beehive as a symbol, early Utah beekeepers wove tales, invoked bee charm, and idolized their bees. The truth is that beekeepers in Utah always employed the most scientific methods of beekeeping in order to produce as much as possible. . . . The land must overflow with milk and honey."

Embracing the Motif

Early in Utah history "As a political kingdom, the beehive reflected that which was self contained and was thus representative of the Mormon settlements. The beehive had definite boundaries and was completely protected. There were no windows looking out to the world and none looking into the Mormon kingdom."

This symbolism and mentality of being united, yet removed from the world in our 'hive' played a part in early history as Utah applied again and again for statehood and was denied. It played a part when Johnston's Army arrived in the valley in 1858. However, by the late 1800's the symbol was looked at and had achieved common meaning to all people who lived in the state. The beehive best suited the vision of "industry" which was pursued with great vigor. Early in the 20th century, Utah embraced a broader population and the beehive was displayed on the lavish Hotel Utah, on dinnerware, stone carving, architecture, etc. Noteworthy, a large department store, Auerbachs, a Jewish business, developed a popular "Beehive Clothing" line.

Thus, it can be said that the "Beehive" has a long history, woven in religion, government, commercial, and personal commitment of togetherness and individual responsibilities.

Quoting Mark Twain, visiting Salt Lake City in its early days, "The Mormon crest was easy. And it was simple, unostentatious, and fitted like a glove. It was a representation of a Golden Beehive, with the bees at work."

Perhaps this bit of history helps explain why a newly designed second Utah flag has been created. Certainly, over generations, the beehive has been the symbol that explains our history and insight as to who we are. It is an ever present icon of us. It even suggests why Lloyd and I have a beehive on our headstone (smiley face). And therein we have company!

The Recreation, Arts, and Parks (RAP) Committee will soon assess available funds, with applications opening in April or May for projects to enhance parks, trails, theater, and arts programs. Watch for details to submit proposals.

The new ICSD Parowan High School Fieldhouse is underway with completion expected by September/October of 2025. The facility is over 21,000 square feet and offers space for basketball, volleyball, pickleball, drop down batting cages and pitching space, cafeteria, classroom, two dressing areas and an office. This new facility will support the physical, emotional and social development of our youth and community with many of our Parowan City Rec Programs planned around our wonderful shared recreational facilities.

Our Public works team has harvested a tremendous amount of material out of the breakwater and will use the sand, gravel and soil on several upcoming projects. The Sidewalk on 200 S, Water Recharge Project and the Evil Water Bike Park will all benefit from this effort that also prepared that area to be ready to manage potential flooding in the coming year. Shout out to Public Works for all of their dedicated work on these important projects and best use of resources to protect Parowan residents and properties.

Speaking of the Evil Water Bike Park, plans are in action to complete the pump track and mountain bike training course by the end of the school year early this summer. What an exciting time for the kids to be able to be outside, improving their skills on their bikes and enjoying the beautiful outdoors at our wonderful Valentine Peak Sports Complex.

With critical plans in place—including our Master Transportation, Power Rate, Water/Sewer, Drainage, and Industrial Manufacturing Zone strategies—we're now focusing on sewer upgrades, road improvements, infrastructure development, historic preservation, and more. These efforts ensure we use our resources wisely for Parowan's present and future needs.

Growth is challenging, but together, we honor our past while shaping our future. From Native Americans and pioneers to farmers, ranchers, and veterans, we recognize those who laid Parowan's foundation in the Mother Town of Southern Utah. As Helen Keller said, "Life is either a daring adventure or nothing at all." May we all find adventure, joy, and cherished memories here as we build our community together.
